Divine humility

Zechariah's is one of those prophecies of the Old Testament that are very hard to understand, centuries after the fact, but that are crucial for the New Testament, and so for the Church. The Apostles and the early Church used Zechariah very much, and so we are very familiar with some images therein. Such as in our first reading this weekend, which predicts that the Messianic King, the much-awaited Son of David, would arrive triumphant and victorious, but humbly riding into the Holy City on the back of a donkey. How many would-be Messiahs must have attempted this entrance into Jerusalem before our Lord made it famous! So today, we look once more at the humility of the Holy One, Who not only enters His own creation as a human being, but arrives poor and claims His throne not on horseback, but upon a donkey. And, as the gospel message says, He wants to see that humility in us also. The humility of a child is what He treasures and rewards with divine wisdom. As the second reading says, that spirit of humility will also be rewarded with eternal life.
