Moses stands for the Law, Elijah the prophecies | the prophecies turn people back to the Law

Eye-witnesses

"We were not crediting fables of man's invention, when we preached to you about the power of our Lord Jesus Christ, and about His coming; we had been eye-witnesses of His exaltation. Such honour, such glory was bestowed on Him by God the Father, that a Voice came to Him out of the splendour which dazzles human eyes; 'This,' It said, 'is My beloved Son, in Whom I am well pleased; to Him, then, listen.' Clothed in light

The Word of God revealed

This weekend by a coincidence, the feast day of the Transfiguration falls on the Sunday and so is able to ride over the Sunday, filling churches with white, a colour that is vividly described in the gospels by the men who heard first-hand descriptions (from the Apostles Ss. Peter, James and John) of Christ dressed in light. As we see in our second reading this Sunday, S. Peter who was charged with the other two to not reveal this vision until after the Resurrection, was eloquent in his description. The picture above is a stylisation of the Transfiguration event, with the transfigured Christ surrounded by the figures of Moses holding the Ten Commandments (a summary of the Hebrew Law) and Elijah holding a scroll of prophecy. Long ago, Christ not yet in the form of man had given the Law to Moses and the words of the prophecies through men like Isaiah, Jeremiah and Ezekiel. Although Elijah left no writings, in the Jewish mind he represented all the prophets. Thus is the Jewish Messiah revealed to the startled Apostles as the fulfilment of Law and Prophecy.
