The reign of Christ


"...when [Christ] completed on the cross the work of redemption whereby He achieved salvation and true freedom for men, He brought His revelation to completion. For He bore witness to the truth, but He refused to impose the truth by force... Not by force of blows does His rule assert its claims. It is established by witnessing to the truth and by hearing the truth, and it extends its dominion by the love whereby Christ, lifted up on the cross, draws all men to Himself." – Dignitatis humanae, #11, of Vatican II

Defending the Faith in peace

"Or the prince of this world, that is, the Devil, is called Caesar; and we cannot render to God the things that are God's, unless we have first rendered to this prince all that is his, that is, have cast off all wickedness. This moreover let us learn from this place, that to those who tempt us we should neither be totally silent, nor yet answer openly, but with caution, to cut off all occasion from those who seek occasion in us, and teach without blame the things which may save those who are willing to be saved." - Origen

The price of relying upon Caesar

"For if there remain with us nothing that is Caesar's, we shall not be bound by the condition of rendering to him the things that are his; but if we lean upon what is his, if we avail ourselves of the lawful protection of his power, we cannot complain of it as any wrong if we are required to render to Caesar the things of Caesar." - S. Hilary



God or the king? Or both?

"Isaiah the prophet names a non-Jewish king, Koresh (or in English Cyrus) who is to restore the Jewish people from seventy years of exile to their own land, the Holy Land. The prophet even calls this Persian emperor an 'anointed' of God, or in the Greek language, a 'Christ.' For he has been chosen by the Holy One for this particular mission; in freeing the Jews to return and rebuild Jerusalem, some five hundred years before Christ, Cyrus would make his own contribution to establishing the environment for the birth of Christ. But the Jews returned to Palestine would not have their own sovereignty for millennia (until the establishment of the modern Zionist state). The family of our Lord would be subjected after the Persian empire to the Macedonian, the Seleucid Greek after that, and then the Roman Empire. Our Lord Himself grew up in Galilee, where there were small Jewish villages and large non-Jewish towns. He would have spoken familiarly the Aramaic of the Persians, in the carpentry business of S. Joseph the Greek of the Macedonians, and in the synagogue the Hebrew of His heritage. The Apostles and early priests like S. Paul knew how to live under empire and respect the human overlord. The Church throughout the world (like Christ) lives under human potentates and governments. The Church has always seen this as a divinely ordained system - we are *meant* to be thus subject to men and nevertheless remain faithful to God. And the incompetence of human governments should make us trust more and rely more upon the benevolent government of God our Lord, Who draws us on to our true end - happiness with Him forever. And so let us in every situation, as Paul says in our second reading today, continue to show our faith in action, our unwearied love, our perseverance through hope in Our Lord Jesus Christ, to Whom be glory and praise now and always."
