Charity begins with God | our love for God is to overflow | it overflows into a love of neighbour

Love and conscience

"In the depths of his conscience, man detects a law which he does not impose upon himself, but which holds him to obedience. Always summoning him to love good and avoid evil, the voice of conscience when necessary speaks to his heart: do this, shun that. For man has in his heart a law written by God; to obey it is the very dignity of man; according to it he will be judged. Conscience is the most secret core and sanctuary of a man. There he is alone with God, Whose voice echoes in his depths. In a wonderful manner conscience reveals that law which is fulfilled by love of God and neighbor. In fidelity to conscience, Christians are joined with the rest of men in the search for truth, and for genuine solution numerous problems which arise in the life of individuals from social relationships. Hence the more right conscience holds sway, the more persons and groups turn aside from blind choice and strive to be guided by the objective norms of morality. Conscience frequently errs from invincible ignorance without losing its dignity. The same cannot be said for a man who cares but little for truth and goodness, or for a conscience which by degrees grows practically sightless as a result of habitual sin." - Gaudium et spes, #16 of the Second Vatican Council



Charity towards God and man

Above is the famous call of the Hebrew people, and the Jewish people, from the book of Deuteronomy. And of the Catholics, also. It is the acknowledgement of the one God, Whom we are to love entirely, and Christ quotes much of it in our gospel message this weekend. To this demand of charity towards Himself, God had attached the demand of charity to neighbour, given in our first reading this evening as foreigners, widows and orphans. So Moses tells the people in the first reading that they must not despise or oppress non-Hebrews, but show them hospitality, for they were themselves foreigners and outsiders in Egypt; and so, let us Christians not despise in any way non-Christians who do not share with us the promises of Christ. Moses tells the Hebrews to not be harsh with widows and orphans - that is, the dispossessed and vulnerable; and so, let us be as charitable as we can with anybody in our experience who is dispossessed and vulnerable. As for the rest of the reading, the law of Christian charity (as much as the Law of Moses) obliges us to not charge interest on loans to the poor and destitute, and to return what was borrowed or taken as a pledge, if the loss of it were to seriously inconvenience another. In all things, after all, as Christ makes clear in the gospel story, the law is charity and endless charity. We owe a debt of charity - a debt of love - to the Holy One, Who created us and has blessed us and desires with a burning Heart (a furnace of love we call the Sacred Heart) to draw us to Himself. He describes this in the reading. And He declares that charity to our neighbour, to those who require it - the poor, the destitute, the dispossessed resembles the charity we owe to God Himself. This charity is taught us by the Holy Spirit and learnt at the feet of Christ and of His Saints - men and women who are an example to us, as indicated this weekend in the second reading, which speaks of instructions and the example of Apostles like S. Paul, and his cooperators. For, in the end, love is the only way.
