# Knowledge and instruction

"...it is well to emphasize and insist that for a priest there is no duty more grave or obligation more binding than [instruction of the Faithful]. Who, indeed, will deny that knowledge should be joined to holiness of life in the priest? The Church demands this knowledge of those who are to be ordained to the priesthood. Why? Because the Christian people expect from them knowledge of the divine law, and it was for that end that they were sent by God." - Holy Father S. Pius X, *Acerbo nimis*, on Christian teaching

#### The Lord restores us

"It is You, Lord, Who cleanses us, as You did first with Your chosen, Moses. It is You Who looked over the tribe of Jacob in their sin and lawlessness, as they became accustomed to the dark pagan ways of the land of Egypt. It is You Who, in the words of the Psalmist David, teaches the sinner to walk in the law of righteousness. It is You Who replaces the stubborn, hardness of stony hearts, with the obedient softness of flesh, receptive to the Word. It is You Who can guide hearts to a single way, respecting You with their full lives. It is You Who instil respect, fear and faith, to heed You, according to the voice of the Prophet." - S. # Malachi and the rotten priests

"Bad and corrupted leaders can cause any community great ruin, and damage the life work of the people, and today the Sunday readings allow us to talk about corruption among leaders of a religious community. The Hebrew priests the prophet Malachi is condemning were not only to offer sacrifices for the people, but also to teach and demonstrate a strong moral character, like our own Catholic priests. But they failed, and became a scandal to the people. We can see from the Gospel reading that the religious leader of our Lord's time - the Pharisees and scribes - taught the Law as of old, but by their own lives had become a scandal to the people. Here Christ condemns them roundly for their hypocrisy, their selfishness, their self-seeking. He sounds like Malachi. Obey their teaching, Christ says, because they have the authority of Moses, but do not copy the way they live. We have ourselves seen massive corruption in the Church in the last sixty years or so, when a relative handful of priests have committed such hideous sin as to grievously harm the whole people, and to forever damage the moral authority of the Church. And the moral life of the Church has suffered, as the catechesis we used to have from priests, religious Sisters, and parents has simultaneously vanished in many places. It seems that the warning of the prophet Malachi is as much ours today, as it was Israel's in the prophet's own time, or Jerusalem's in the time of our Lord. Why would anybody today trust the priests of the Church? Because we know that a few sinful men does not tarnish the ideal. And we shall find the ideal of the Christian priesthood in our second reading today, from S. Paul, one of our first priests, a man who took the place of God for his people and could be called Father, Teacher and Rabbi: he was like a mother feeding and caring for her children, willing to give his life for them, a hard worker, and an evangelist. May he inspire new generations of priests and leaders to restore and rebuild the Church."
