God saves

" "Jesus means in Hebrew: 'God saves.' At the Annunciation, the angel Gabriel gave Him the name Jesus as His proper name, which expresses both His identity and His mission. Since God alone can forgive sins, it is God Who, in Jesus His eternal Son made man, 'will save His people from their sins.' in Jesus, God recapitulates all of His history of salvation on behalf of men." - Catechism \$430

Please remember that Christmas is not only one day, for the Church celebrates for at least eight days of what we call an 'octave,' and the Christmas season of old has stretched to the second day of February. May you be all blessed. - Fr. Kevin."



The Word was made flesh and dwelt amongst us

"Thus begins the shortest week of Advent possible, which only happens when Christmas is on a Monday. On this fourth Sunday of Advent, we find that king David wants to build a stone temple for the God of Israel. Or at least a wooden one. The king feels guilty that, after his long life of tumultuous war, he lives in a house of wood, but the tabernacle of the presence of God still sits in the humble tent design that Moses had given the people centuries before. At first the court prophet Nathan, who trusts in God's protection of David, is inclined to allow the king to have his way. But he gets a stern warning from God, who knows well of David's sinful life. It is rather his son Solomon who would build, having killed fewer men in his time. But as the prophet Nathan goes on, we find that God is looking beyond the stone Temple to find a purer vessel for Himself in inhabit. We know that He first chose our Lady Mary to be that vessel for some nine months, while He prepared for Himself the ultimate Temple, His own human body. This Catholics of the Latin tradition call the Incarnation, when God built a Temple for Himself out of the substance of our own humanity. But first came Mary, and so in our gospel message, the Virgin appears to give assent to the angel for her being made into a tabernacle of the most High God. This is the mystery we celebrate in the next few days: the mystery of how the God-man emerges from His tabernacle and becomes the instrument of our atonement with God."
