THE EPIPHANY OF OUR LORD

An epiphany is a manifestation of God | The God-child is revealed to the world | Come, let us adore

Christ the true light

"The light that shone in the night at Christmas illuminating the Bethlehem Grotto, where Mary, Joseph and the remained shepherds silent adoration, shines out today and is manifested to all. The Epiphany is a mystery of light, symbolically suggested by the star that guided the Magi on their journey. The true source of light, however, the 'sun that rises from on high,' is Christ." - Holy Father Benedict XVI, his homilies

Light to the nations

"The magi's coming to Jerusalem in order to pay homage to the king of the Jews shows that they seek in Israel, in the messianic light of the star of David, the one who will be king of the nations. Their coming means that pagans can discover Jesus and worship Him as Son of God and Saviour of the world only by turning towards the Jews and receiving from them the messianic promise..." - Catechism, §528

Lighting the way

"The star is the way, and the way is Christ; and according to the mystery of the incarnation, Christ is a star. He is a blazing and a morning-star. Thus where Herod is, the star is not seen; where Christ is, there it is again seen, and points out the way." - S. Ambrose of Milan



Manifested to the world

"This weekend marks the transferred feast of the Epiphany of Christ to the three kings who came from the East. An epiphany is a manifestation of God, so you could perhaps see that although this feast is the Epiphany, our Lord was manifested to the people in various ways, at different events. So, today, the Church also remembers a series of epiphanies, that will be marked successively in January. There is this epiphany to the kings of the East, the epiphany to John the Baptist at the Baptism of our Lord (when heaven opened and the Holy Trinity was revealed), and the epiphany to the Apostles at the wedding feast at Cana in Galilee (when Christ for the first time openly self-identified as not only the Messiah, but as the ancient God of Israel). Of all these manifestations, today's is specifically made to a non-Jewish audience, three kings who had followed a light in the sky for months, that they may discover the new, Jewish King. So the first reading from Isaiah speaks of Jerusalem now delivering its light not only to the Jewish people, but to all the tribes of the earth. The prophet speaks of Christ endlessly as Light, and S. Paul in the second reading declares that what was evident to the prophets and later to the Apostles - the ancient mystery of God's salvation - is now given to non-Jews ('pagans,' it says) as an inheritance. Why should Herod fear Christ so much? Because of the prophecies, and particularly that of Daniel, which had said that the Shepherd-King to come would be a conqueror of hearts, and so would not only rock but destroy the glory of all the ancient empires. As the great Martyrs of the Church have shown us, not the worse tortures, not even death itself, has since separated men and women from the love of Christ."
