# The gift of virginity

"An eminent position among [the counsels of the Lord to His Apostles] is held by virginity or the celibate state. This is a precious gift of divine grace given by the Father to certain souls, whereby they may devote themselves to God alone the more easily, due to an undivided heart..."



# The end of consecrated virginity

"[Virginal chastity] not only symbolizes in a singular way the heavenly goods but also the most suitable means by which Religious dedicate themselves with undivided heart to the service of God and the works of the apostolate. In this way, they recall to the minds of all the faithful that wondrous marriage decreed by God and which is to be fully revealed in the future age in which the Church takes Christ as its only spouse." - Perfectae caritatis 12, of the Holy Father Paul VI (1965)

# But still... marriage!!

"Virginity or celibacy for the sake of the Kingdom of God not only does not contradict the dignity of marriage but presupposes it and confirms it. Marriage and virginity or celibacy are two ways of expressing and living the one mystery of the covenant of God with His people. When marriage is not esteemed, neither can consecrated virginity or celibacy exist..." - Familiaris consortio 16, of the Holy Father John Paul II (1981)



## The Teacher above all teachers

"We heard some Sundays ago of how, when S. John the Baptist very daringly established a ritual baptism of repentance for sin, he was accosted by priests and zealots from the Jerusalem Temple. On that occasion they asked John in sequence: Are you Elijah, Are you Christ, Are you the Prophet? Jewish people of the first century were looking for these three figures to emerge out of the distant light of prophecy to redeem them from their enslavements. In terms of their expectations, we know a little of the fiery prophet Elijah who had a reputation for defending the Hebrew religion. And we know something of the expectations of the Messiah: the great shepherd-king who would lead the people back to their covenant relationship with God. In our first reading today, we learn about the third figure: the mysterious Prophet-Teacher who Moses had said would one day replace him (Moses) as the teacher and law-giver to the people, as even modern Jews still insist he is. But Moses was aware that another and greater Prophet would replace him. We can hear Christ's voice of authority in the gospel story this weekend. As we say in refrain for the psalm this weekend, O that today we should listen to His voice, our Teacher, our Rabbi, God Almighty in the flesh. And to what end? In order that we may have peace. We who are poor and lowly should not have to think and decide for ourselves the right way to live, and what is good and what is evil, what we should do and what we should not do. All this should be plain to us, either by the light of reason or by God's revelation to us. But we Christians are a wretchedly divided people, endlessly prey to confusion and ambiguity, with endless churches and ecclesial communities fighting each other over basic moral teachings, mostly because of our pride, and often our rejection of the structures of authority Christ left behind. We must always remember that Christ is the Way, the Way is narrow and difficult, so that he has left us teachers to guide us along the way; but we must keep our eyes on Christ, and not worry."
