

A surviving remnant

If we look down the history of the people of God, we find that with every great destruction of the people a small remnant survived in faith and devotion and became prosperous again. In our first reading this weekend, we hear of the calamitous destruction of Jerusalem in 587BC. The people had ignored God's commandments, they had ignored the Law of charity. Failing in their charity towards God, they had fallen into idolatry and syncretism, and they had then naturally fallen into moral depravity. Found unrepentant, they had been sent the scourge of the Babylonian king, who razed Jerusalem to the ground and carried away most of the people into exile. But the reading ends with a remnant of this people in Babylon who were permitted by the Persian king Cyrus to return to Jerusalem and rebuild. And within a few centuries, Christ would be on the streets of Jerusalem calling for the people to repent and return to Him, their ancient God, or calamity would strike again. And they crucified Him, and found unrepentant were met with the scourge of the Roman legions, who razed Jerusalem to the ground again. But a remnant of the people would remain in the Jewish community and especially also in the Church of Christ. Jerusalem stands for the earthly glory of the Chosen People. In so far as we rest upon earthly glory and ignore the glory of the Holy One Who lives within the Temple, we have fallen into error. The Church too has an earthly glory, but our gaze must be set upon the glory of the Holy One Who lives within our hearts as within His Temple of old, in Jerusalem. Our gospel reading this weekend is a discourse between Christ and the Pharisee Saint Nicodemus on baptism, which establishes a belonging to Christ. There will come a time at the end of all things when all things will pass away, as with the world of Noah's youth and the sinful Jerusalem of the prophets. But there will be a remnant, as there always is, of those who in baptism embraced the light of Christ.
