#### Cultivated as a vine

"For we cultivate God, and God cultivates us... His culture of us makes us better. His culture consists in extirpating all the seeds of wickedness from our hearts, in opening our heart to the plough, as it were, of His word, in sowing in us the seeds of His commandments, in waiting for the fruits of piety." - S. Augustine

# Pruned through suffering

"The one branch, because it is fruitless, cannot even remain in the Vine, but for the other, because it beareth fruit, He rendereth it more fruitful. This, some one might assert, was said with relation also to the persecutions then coming upon them... persecutions rather make men stronger." - S. John Chrysostom

## Producing fruit

"The Church... which is called 'that Jerusalem which is above' and 'our mother', is described as the spotless spouse of the spotless lamb. It is she whom Christ 'loved and for whom He delivered himself up that He might sanctify her.' It is she whom He unites to Himself by an unbreakable alliance, Не constantly 'nourishes and cherishes.'" -Catechism §757



## One in Christ - Jew and Gentile

"Over the years, I have several accounts of the conversion of Jews in our own times, and the usual theme I find is this: a Jew who accepts Christ and somehow becomes a Christian doesn't feel that he or she has ceased to be a Jew; rather, they find that their Jewishness is deepened and that they stand at the end of a long story that began millenia ago with the election of the patriarch Abraham. This forms a good introduction to the two principal readings today. In the first reading, we find that S. Paul, some time after having his extraordinary conversion on the road to Damascus, is now looking for the Apostles. For Paul had already been given a task by Christ - he was to be a missionary to carry the Christian religion beyond the bounds of Judaea, to the Greek countries and beyond. So, Paul went with the support of S. Barnabas to Jerusalem, to receive apostolic authority for his mission. This proud Pharisee now kneels before Christ's regents in humility and, with their authority, creates such a stir in the Holy City that he must be sent off for his safety. Consider the plight of all converts like Paul, and like the rabbi I mentioned earlier, and also converts to Catholicism. They don't usually suffer violence anymore, but they quickly become pariahs among their former communities, cut off and abandoned. They should not be abandoned by us. Let us pray first of all for the conversion of the hearts of our Jewish brothers and sisters, through the intercession of OL and the Apostles, and the Saints of the early Church - all Jews. Our gospel message establishes the picture of the vine of the Church, as Christ explains to His Jewish audience that they are branches on that vine. Paul would later explain in his letters that non-Jewish people such as ourselves are grafted onto that very Jewish vine through baptism. And the life that flows through us - the sap of the vine - is the grace of God, through which we are either pruned to bear fruit, or else destroyed. And so we are to preach, all of us both by our words and by real and active lives of faith (as S. John also says in the second reading), we are to bring the pride of this world to its knees before Christ."
