• Consider how to vote at the General Election (4th July): From the Bishops about Education:

"Catholic schools support parents as the primary educators of their children and welcome anyone who seeks a Catholic education for their child. The 2,100 Catholic schools make up 9% of the state-funded sector and are considerably more ethnically diverse than the national average, taking in more pupils from the poorest households, and outperforming state schools at GCSE. The Catholic community provides the government with rent-free land and buildings for schools, and by contributing to capital costs saves taxpayers hundreds of millions of pounds. This partnership with the State has resulted in protection of the core principles of Catholic education, such as the ability to give priority in admissions to Catholic children, and to teach a Catholic curriculum for Religious Education. Catholic education is popular with parents and successful in preparing pupils for life in modern Britain. However, there are campaigns to get rid of schools with a religious character, and to change the curriculum so that our schools would no longer be Catholic. Consider whether election candidates support the creation of new Catholic schools through the removal of the cap on faith-based admissions? Whether they recognise the importance of Catholic leaders, teachers and governors in maintaining the Catholic school ethos? How will they safeguard parents' rights as the primary educators including their right to withdraw their child from Relationships and Sex education and Religious Education?"

The Church as a boat on the waves | Christ sleeps in the boat | Be of good faith and hope!

### Why's He asleep?

"Showing His humility, and thus teaching us many lessons of wisdom. But not yet did the disciples who remained about Him know His glory; they thought indeed that if He arose He could command the winds, but could by no means do so reposing or asleep." - S. John Chrysostom

# Asleep in His Passion and Death

"...when He ascended the cross, of which the stern of the ship was type, His blaspheming persecutors rose like the waves against Him... The disciples awake the Lord, because they sought, with most earnest wishes, the resurrection of Him whom they had seen die. Rising up, He threatened the wind, because when He had triumphed in His Resurrection, He prostrated the pride of the devil." - S. Beda the Venerable

#### Awake, Christian soul

"Without a doubt, the man in whom the faith of Christ sleeps will perish. It should be reawakened with renewed devotion, with the cry confession and with the hand of holy activity. 'Then, rising up, He commanded the winds and the sea.' This is similar to what Job says: 'Who shut up the sea with doors? And I said: Hitherto shalt thou come, and shalt go no farther. And here thou shalt break thy swelling wave." - S. Anthony



#### Faith and trust

Our readings this weekend speak of our trust in the providence of God, Who always has the bigger picture, and knows therefore what is best at all times. He says so much to the patriarch Job in our first reading today. In the story of Job, this venerable old man had lost his family and his fortune, and finally his own health. Sitting in misery, he had called up to heaven that he was innocent of all wrongdoing and dared to put God in the dock, demanding that He, God, defend the attack upon Job. So came the Most High in this tempest in our reading, to put Job in his place and to ask him to be patient in suffering. So God provides, but He expects us to trust at the same time, and even in suffering, that He will bring all things to a good end. Let's compare this with the gospel story... Christ and the Apostles in a boat, great storm, Christ asleep in the boat. When Job was in the midst of great suffering, it seemed as if God was asleep, or at least unaware of his pain. So, we have the Apostles struggling and calling in despair for the Holy One, asleep in the stern. 'Master! Do you not care that we are going down??' Christ awakes and God descends to Job in a tempest. As Job's suffering ends in an instant, now the storm dies away in Galilee. And the rebuke of the Holy One is the same: Why did you not trust? The story of the Bible and of the history of the Church is of men and women repeatedly failing in their trust in God, and then of finding it again. We too should weather the storm and say afterward in wonder, 'Who can this be, our Friend, that even the very wind and the sea obey Him? That all that we feared has fallen to its knees before Him?' S. Paul suggests an extreme of this trust in our second reading: that we live without care, seeing the world in the light of the Resurrection, very aware that beyond suffering and death there is always new life. The Christian soul is living in a new creation, Paul says, the old having passed away. And such a Christian philosophy is only possible to men and women who live continually in trust in the providence of God.
