Awaiting the King

Having last Sunday celebrated the triumph of the Son of David, we cycle around again this Sunday to the centuries of expectation of the Messiah. This is what Advent is - a time of stepping into the shoes of those Jewish men and women of the late Jewish period, especially in the last few decades before Christ, in their vigil of waiting for the coming Messiah. Following the destruction of the Jewish kingdoms in the sixth century BC, and the several attempts of great kings and rulers to break the spirit of the Jewish nation, prophecy predicted the restoration of the Davidic monarchy in the son of David, and the prophet Daniel predicted with some precision when this would happen. As that moment drew near, the people looked here and there for the promised King of the Jews. In our first reading, the prophet Jeremiah mentions the promise made to the nation of Israel concerning the house of Judah, and the prophet speaks of the Branch. Jeremiah who prophesied and witnessed the destruction of the Jewish kingdom and of Jerusalem - and so the destruction of the Davidic dynasty - speaks of a Branch sprouting from the stump of the felled tree of David. The Hebrew root for the word 'branch' is nzr, nazara. If that sounds familiar, it's because it is the root of the name Nazareth, a town where several descendants of the House of Judah and the family of David were resident, such as the family of the Blessed Virgin. With their eyes on Nazareth therefore, how would Jewish believers have prepared themselves for the imminent arrival of the Branch, of the Son of David, of the Messiah? We could suggest the Catholic model of the vigil of a great feast, such as Advent and Lent: prayerful waiting, penitence, personal purification, and a greater commitment to the setting aside of sin. The second reading and the gospel story echo this aspect of prayerful waiting for the return of Christ with a life of holiness - a life which is a continual vigil - the gospel adding that it will allows us to stand confidently in all purity before the Son of Man.
